- I. To ensure students' language proficiency and enhance their competitiveness for employment, Wenzao Ursuline University of Languages (hereinafter referred to as the University) has established the Guidelines for Verification of Language Proficiency (hereinafter referred to as the Guidelines) in accordance with the University's Academic Policies for both the college program and the junior college..
- II. The Guidelines apply to students of the Daytime College Division (4-Year College, 2-Year College) admitted after the 2012 academic year, as well as all incoming students of the Junior College Division.
- III. The level of the language proficiency exam is determined by each academic department, and takes effect after approval from the Academic Affairs Committee, the Administrative Committee, and the President.
- IV. Graduating students of the college program (four-year college and two-year college) or junior college who fail to meet the language proficiency requirements for their major language shall take two terms of "Substitute Courses for Language Proficiency Tests"; those who fail to meet the language proficiency requirements for their minor language shall take one term of "Substitute Courses for Language Proficiency Tests". This regulation applies to graduates from the academic year of 2012. Those who pass the substitute courses will be considered to have met the language proficiency requirements.

English is considered the major language for students of the Department of Foreign Language Instruction and the Department of Translation and Interpreting.
- V. Students who have completed all required courses, earned all required credits, and met other graduation requirements set by the University or the department, but have not met the language proficiency requirements or passed all substitute courses, will be considered delayed graduates and must follow the Academic Policies to continue their studies.
- VI. The Guidelines become effective after they are approved by the Academic Affairs Committee and ratified by the President. Revisions must follow the same procedures.
